## We Care

Tri-annual Report to Board, May 21, 2019 Emergency Financial Assistance Provided: Jan – April 2020 Submitted by: Rex Cole, We Care Intake Coordinator

Within the first four months of 2020 We Care quickly adapted to the new realities of the COVID-19 epidemic and continued to provide emergency financial assistance to Benton County residents.

## Population Served.

During January-April 2020, We Care received 181 inquiries and 145 applications for assistance. After initial screening, volunteers presented the We Care board with 125 requests for consideration. <u>The board approved 103 assistance requests</u> and denied 12; 10 applications were withdrawn. The households assisted were in Corvallis (92), Philomath (6), N. Albany (2), & Alsea (2), Monroe (1). <u>Fifty (49%) of the approved</u> <u>requests were for families with children</u>, and a total of 105 children were in the assisted families. Twenty-six of the households assisted included a member with a disability. A comparison of this data with previous years is provided in Table 1.

From the middle of March until near the end of April, there was a notable lull in the number of applicants, as people awaited their COVID-19 stimulus checks, unemployment benefits, and a clearer picture of what would happen next. The moratoriums on evictions and shut-offs of electricity and water also had an impact. The first COVID-19 affected family came to We Care seeking assistance on March 23, but the wave of financial need did not hit until the last week in April. The column to the right of Table 1 shows the numbers associated with We Care applicants through the end of April who had lost jobs or income to COVID-19. Currently, as of the second week in May, **We Care has assisted thirty-one COVID-19 affected households (49 adults and 32 children) providing a total of \$ 21,246 in assistance**. ## Assistance Provided

Thanks to generous donations by the Benton Community Foundation, our faith community partners, and concerned others, we were able to increase the amount of assistance provided to families by 34% to \$ 48,931 during the period from January through April, compared to the same period in the previous year. This increase was greatest for rental assistance, the primary request by those with COVID-19 related job or income losses.

## **Diversity of Population Served**

We Care has a strict non-discrimination policy. Board members approving assistance are blind to the racial or ethnic identity of the applicants, and information about racial or ethnic identity is normally not requested during the application process. However, to verify that We Care assistance was reaching a racially/ethnically diverse population, a survey was taken of those receiving assistance. A member of each household approved for assistance was asked what ethnic and/or racial group each member of the household identified as their own. We were able to collect data for 89% (213 of 239) of the individuals and 89% (92 of 103) of the households receiving assistance from January through April.
